Geraldton up there as "Destination of the Year"

Geraldton recently went up against Dubai and Norway for the prestigious 'Destination of the Year' award as part of the Seatrade Cruise Awards 2018.

For the 12th year running, the Awards recognise success stories in the cruise industry from ports, innovative shore excursions and outstanding service to the industry.

Dubai was named the winner at the Awards in September, however City of Greater Geraldton Mayor, Shane Van Styn, said Geraldton had become a very popular destination for cruise ships to stop. "In February alone, we had a total of five ships visit our City – four of them had never visited Geraldton before," he said.

"Geraldton has really promoted itself as a destination of choice for cruise ships and we've worked hard to foster relationships to ensure we are on the radar."

"Our dedication to promoting cruisetourism is very apparent as we will have our first over-night stay from a cruise ship, Azamara Quest on Monday 17 and Tuesday 18 December."

The Destination of the Year category is awarded to a region/tourism body/ association which has made significant strides in promoting cruise-tourism

over the past 12 months.

Geraldton's nomination for this award stems from a joint initiative by Mid West Ports Authority and the City of Greater Geraldton to recruit a Cruise Ship Officer to develop and grow the cruise ship industry in Geraldton. This initiative was a first in Western Australia and has proven to be very beneficial and successful for Geraldton as a cruise ship destination.

On behalf of ACA, we would like to congratulate Geraldton for making it into the final three nominees for this prestigious award.

Cruise Industry Sustainability Guide

Together with CLIA and New Zealand Cruise Association, we recently released the first Cruise Industry Sustainability Guide for this region to showcase the work being done by the industry to preserve the world's pristine waterways.

Although cruise ships represent less than one percent of the global shipping fleet, this important sector is taking the lead in several critical areas underscoring their commitment to sustainability and responsibility.

The initiatives fall broadly into five categories:

- 1. Cleaner Fuel and Reduced Emissions;
- 2. Recycle, Reduce and Reuse;
- 3. Waste Management Practices;
- 4. Destination Sustainability; and
- 5. Working Together.

The cruise industry is working closely across this region to help drive these

sustainability initiatives. Together, they are also collaborating with a larger global community including government bodies and independent organisations such as the World Ocean Council and the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority to explore best practice.

ACA is very focused on working closely with the cruise lines and ACA members to support port infrastructure needs.

Managing the growth in visitor numbers is also high on the agenda for cruise lines and destinations.

Consultation and education are being provided as to how best to ensure the

visitor experience is maintained while continuing to provide much needed economic income for the destinations.

The guide will be distributed to the members of each organisation, who in turn are being encouraged to send this out to their broader communities, to increase awareness for the important work being done by the cruise industry as a collaborative effort.

ACA is committed to working with the cruise lines, the ports and the destinations recognising the crucial role of connectivity between all parties to develop viable short and long-term solutions for a sustainable and exciting future for our industry.

Amazing Indigenous tourism opportunities

We increasingly hear that travellers are making their cruise decisions based not only on the onboard offerings but also what is happening onshore.

We have exceptional opportunities at our many Australian ports to illustrate that our country is exciting, diverse and offers experiences that cruise passengers can't find anywhere else in the world.

Opportunities to learn about our country's fascinating history, interact with nature, enjoy our world-class food and wine and explore our vast landscapes rate highly with cruise passengers.

Indigenous touring and cultural activities are also standout examples of how we will ensure that particularly our regional ports in Australia remain on cruise ship itineraries into the future.

ACA and our members work closely with indigenous communities to help them become cruise-ready and explore every opportunity to introduce their products to passengers. As a result, we were delighted to be invited to participate recently in the Australian Indigenous Tourism Conference.

Bart Pigram from Narlijia Tours in WA – one of the AITC speakers who also worked with ACA at our recent conference - is a success story in our sector. He began his company three years ago and has adapted his tours for cruise passengers giving them an authentic insight into the history and culture in Broome seen through his eyes as a saltwater man. His tours are filled with interesting first-person stories and incorporate one-off experiences such as musical performances by Bart and his family members and the opportunity to try the famous local Nanna Pig's fish soup.

Over the other side of Australia, in Tropical North Queensland, the traditional owners welcome cruise passengers to stunning Mossman Gorge taking them on Ngadiku Walks – sharing stories and legends from their culture. Guests are welcomed with a smoking ceremony to ward off bad spirits before being guided through the rainforest by an indigenous guide identifying plants and their uses as food

or medicinal sources. They also share their traditions like making bush soaps and painting with local ochre.

Similar tours are run in Ben Boyd Park near Eden. More often known for its whaling history, the indigenous cultural experience has now become a favourite shore excursion particularly for international cruise passengers.

The walk to Haycock Point on the south coast of NSW, takes in stunning scenery and showcases the aboriginal history of the area. Guests are often treated to sightings of kangaroos, wallabies and seabirds. Aboriginal guides enthusiastically engage in local storytelling and share their history and culture.

With over 30% of the 109 new ships currently on order being smaller luxury and expedition vessels, I am excited that regional ports around the country offering these important indigenous experiences are seeing increased visitation and have no doubt they will remain a must-see on cruise itineraries.

First female Hotel General Manager to roll out new Princess ship
